

she has heard, excepting Genl. Washington of whom  
her husband often spoke.

She further declares that she was married  
to the said Frederick Filler, sometime in the  
month of April next after the surrender of Lord  
Cornwallis, and that her husband the said  
Frederick Filler, died on or about the 27<sup>th</sup> day of  
November A.D. 1794, of a disease which he he  
had contracted, as he alleged, in the Army: that  
she was not married to him prior to his leaving  
the service, but the marriage took place previous  
to the 1<sup>st</sup> of January A.D. 1794 - as above stated.

That she has no records of the marriage, which  
took place in Frederick County Maryland, -  
and that Guy Adam Brown was present  
at the marriage & officiated as Groomsman.  
That she has no documentary evidence of  
the service of her said husband, nor does  
she now know of any person living who can  
testify <sup>in relation to</sup> them: but she has understood that  
Philip Studor, a Revolutionary pensioner (now  
deceased) was in the same regiment with him.

Applicant further states that by reason of  
her advanced age, and the infirmities incident  
thereunto, she is unable to appear at the Court,  
conveniently, to make this declaration.

Applicant also states that she was married  
about eight years after the death of the said  
Frederick Filler, to Christian Hancock, who died  
about the latter part of the year 1812 or the beginning  
of the year 1813.
