testify that it appears to my satisfaction that the
said John C. Fisher did serve in the
Revolutionary war as stated in the
preceding declaration and in the affidavit
of Charles F. Brown on the other side written
against the common enemy - and I now
transmit the testimony and proceedings
taken & had before me to the Secretary
for the Department of War pursuant to the
directions of the aforementioned act of Congress
At my hand this 27th day of April 1815
