

Blomingsdale, after which they commenced building a Fort called
Fort Moin's below Fort Washington, but did not complete it. They
then commenced another above Fort Washington at the mouth
of Kingsbridge River, but marched away after they had laid
the foundation - About this time the English having sailed
& landed up the East River, they marched to East Chester where
they encamped for a short time - whilst there, there was some
skirmishing but no regular engagement. They marched thence
to the White Plains & remained there about eight days during
which time the battle of White Plains occurred in which this
applicant took a part. From White Plains they marched
up to Groverus Bridge - from thence to a Town on North River
the name of which applicant ^{cannot} recollect - Thence they went by
water down the River to a ferry the name of which he has also
forgotten & landed on the Jersey side, & encamped two days &
a night - They then marched through Jersey to Fort Lee there
thirteen men were selected out of each company to go to Fort
Washington - This applicant was chosen but was unable to go
in consequence of illness - his captain was taken at Fort Wash-
-ington with the men from his company - After remaining two
days at Fort Lee the landing of the British compelled them
to abandon it & all their baggage &c. He afterwards saw the
magazine blown up at the crop Roads about two & a half
miles from the fort - and after the battle of Fort Washington
