

up. That whilst at the White Plains they had an engagement with the enemy, but not to any extent, and were daily in expectation of a general battle, which was prevented he believes by a rain. This he thinks was in October. That from the White Plains they went to the North River which they crossed at a village called Daily, they marched thence to Hackensack and thence to Trenton & Princeton. That he took part in the battle at Princeton, but was not in the whole of it, having come up towards the close of it. That at Princeton he took sick, and it being about the expiration of his term of service, he received a certificate from Dr. Otter for his admission to the hospital, some time after which he returned home. That in consequence of this sickness and his confinement he did not receive any regular discharge.

That in the month of June, ^{or July} 1777, he was called out with the militia of Berks County. That from Reading they were marched to Philadelphia, thence to Chester, thence to Wilmington, Delaware, thence to the Iron Mill at Christmas Bridge. They then returned up the Delaware toward Wilmington previous to the battle of Brandywine, and that he was there until after the battle, in which he actively participated. That after the battle they marched up the Schuylkill, and had a skirmish with the enemy - they then crossed the Schuylkill near the Falls where they encamped and remained some time, and his term expiring he returned thence to his home. That this tour was for two months, during which time he was in the Company commanded by Captain Whetstone, in Col. Leidenbuth's Regiment, and Genl. Potts's Brigade.

That the winter following he was again drafted but being sick he was compelled to procure a substitute who served two months for him.
