

at which Captain Philips with some men had been stationed in Woodcock Valley, had been attacked by the Indians & burned. Apple and that he with seven others started in pursuit. They came to the house, found it burned as stated, and started thence on the trail of the Indians and after following probably half a mile came to a spot near Tappan's mountain where they found ten of Philips's men killed scalped & stripped. Two of the men, brothers, had been tied together to a sapling & shot through with arrows, - another had been killed by having been stuck in the neck like a hog. Applicant once also rode from Peper's farm over Tappan's Mountain after night to Morris Garrison, to give information that the Indians had come in, and went back again the same night.

Applicant further saith that he was born in York Town in the year 1761 - & was about 11 or 12 years of age when he came to this County. He has a record of his age - He was called into the service by enlistment in the militia & volunteering - and was about sixteen years of age when he first went out. - He has lived in Bedford County ever since the Revolutionary war.

He now had a commission.

That the Per<sup>o</sup> Geo. McAlhenny and Major John Piper can testify as to his character <sup>for</sup> <sup>the</sup> <sup>value</sup> <sup>of</sup> <sup>his</sup> <sup>services</sup>, and that John McAlhenny, John Young & Genl. M<sup>o</sup> Piper can testify as to his services. Had one discharge but lost it.
