the Tories had formed a junction with the Indians

in the month of August one thousand seven hundred and  
eighty he was commissioned as an ensign by the supreme  
Executive council of Pennsylvania and served by the au-  
thority of said Commission for the space of seven months  
the officers under whose command he served were Captain John  
Moore late Judge Moore of Bedford county and Lieuten-  
ant William McCall his own officers and men being  
strangers to the place the severe station the fatigue  
of conducting them day and night in search of Indians  
and pursuing them fell principally on Deponent

After Deponent was discharged he continued his  
services as spy and as guide to all that bated upon  
him against the Indians to the end of the Revolutionary  
war

he hereby relinquishes every claim whatsoever to a  
pension or annuity except the present and declares  
that his name is not on the pension rolls of the agency  
of any State
