

ordinary Garrison duty, and went on expeditions to and
from different officers of the Regiment. This service
was performed at Martin's Fork, on the Juniata, in
Bedford County, and under the immediate command
of Lieutenant Jonathan Buck. His next tour of
service was with a Corps of Volunteers called "Seven
months men", who, under the command of Captain
(afterwards Col.) John Moore, were marched against the
Indians. They were stationed at Frankstown during
said tour, scouted against the Indians, and had some
skirmishes with them, the particulars of which she
cannot recollect. They were out at this time seven
months. The tour also mentioned, of two months was
in the year 1777, and the last mentioned, of seven
months, she thinks, was in 1778. She remembers that
after this, he served several tours in the militia, against
the Indians, one of which was at Wicogawa's Fort,
and one at Piper's Fort and Frankstown, and the
last at the Croppings, at Martin's Fort. He had previously
been elected or appointed, a Captain, and served in
that capacity during said tours. She cannot say
at what particular periods these services were performed,
but each tour was not less than two months, and
her impression is, that he was out longer, but how
much she cannot say. Applicant states that she has
been enabled to recollect the facts she has stated, chiefly,
from the circumstance that she was acquainted with
her said husband, from his boyhood, and was herself
familiar with the various occurrences and movements of
the inhabitants of that day, having come into the county
in, about, the eleventh year of her age. She further declares
