Be it Remembered that on the fourteenth day of April
in the year of our Lord one Thousand eight hundred
and Eighteen before me David Stewart one of the
Associate Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in and
for the County of Huntingdon in the Commonwealth
of Pennsylvania personally appeared James Duncan
of the Township of Henderson in the said County of
Huntingdon and a resident Citizen of the United States
and being duly sworn according to law doth and
did declare and say that he entered into the army
of the United Colonies raised for the defence of
American Liberty and for repelling every hostile
invasion thereof as a private soldier in the company
of Captain William Heiser in a Body of Troops
called the German Battalion commanded
by Colonel Hoosac and Lieutenant Colonel
Sturges in the year of our Lord one Thousand
Seven hundred and Seventy Six - That he was
at the Battle of Trenton at the taking of the
Hessians - That he was afterwards in another Battle
at Trenton - That he was in the Battle of Princeton
Brandywine Germantown in the year of our
Lord one Thousand seven hundred and
Seventy Seven, after which he went into winter
quarters at the valley Forge where he remained
all winter - That the next year he was in
the Battle of Monmouth - That he afterwards went
with General Sullivan to Wyoming in Pursuit
of the Indians - That he served in the army
of the United Colonies afterwards the United States
of America for and during the Term of three
years when he was honorably discharged about
fourteen miles above Wyoming aforesaid, which
discharge was lost when he was removing from
Frederick Town to Krager's Town in the State
of Maryland - That he hath no Pension heretofore
