Madam:

In reply to your letter of the 5th ultimo, you are advised that in the papers in the pension claim Rejected File No. 3,479, it is alleged that John Fee was enrolled at Philadelphia, in January 1777, in Captain Thomas Clug-gage's Company, Colonel John Piper's Regiment, was discharged the following March or April and returned home to Huntingdon, Pennsylvania. Also that he turned out against the Indians and Tories on many alarms. It is not stated that he served during the War of 1812.

Soldier married June 16, 1791, Jane, whose maiden name is not stated. He died August 26, 1845 aged about eighty-five years. He was referred to as Colonel John Fee, but no explanation is given of said title.

His widow Jane applied for pension December 31, 1850, while living in Huntingdon County, Pennsylvania, aged eighty-one years, but her claim was rejected on the ground of no proof of six months actual military service as required by the pension laws.
