months of the before mentioned time at Fort

any discharge ~~other~~, than a verbal one
from the Captain of the before mentioned
vesel - That he has lost the sight of his eyes
for upwards of Two years - That he is now
about fifty years of age - That he hath no
Pension heretofore allowed him by the laws
of the United States, to his knowledge, and if
any such exists, he doth hereby fully and entirely
release the same to the United States - That
by reason of his reduced circumstances in life
he stands in need of the assistance of his
Country for support -
